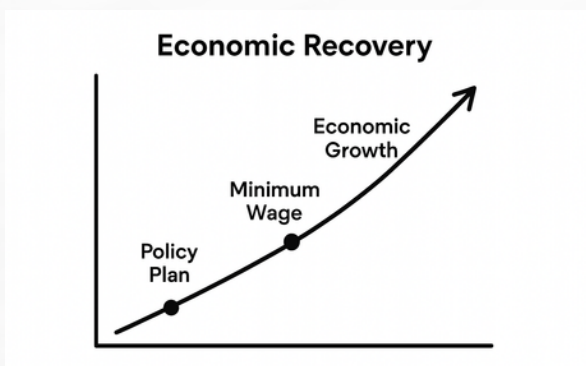

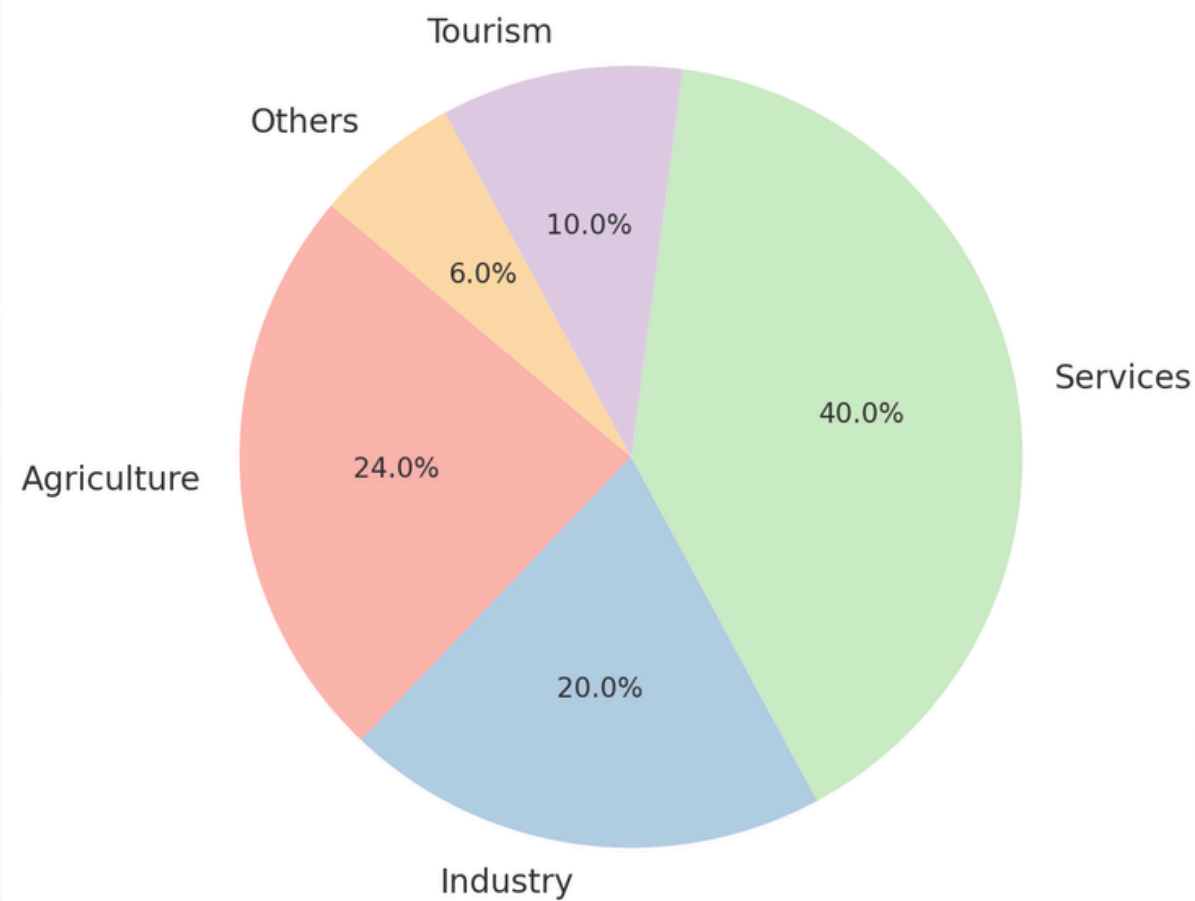

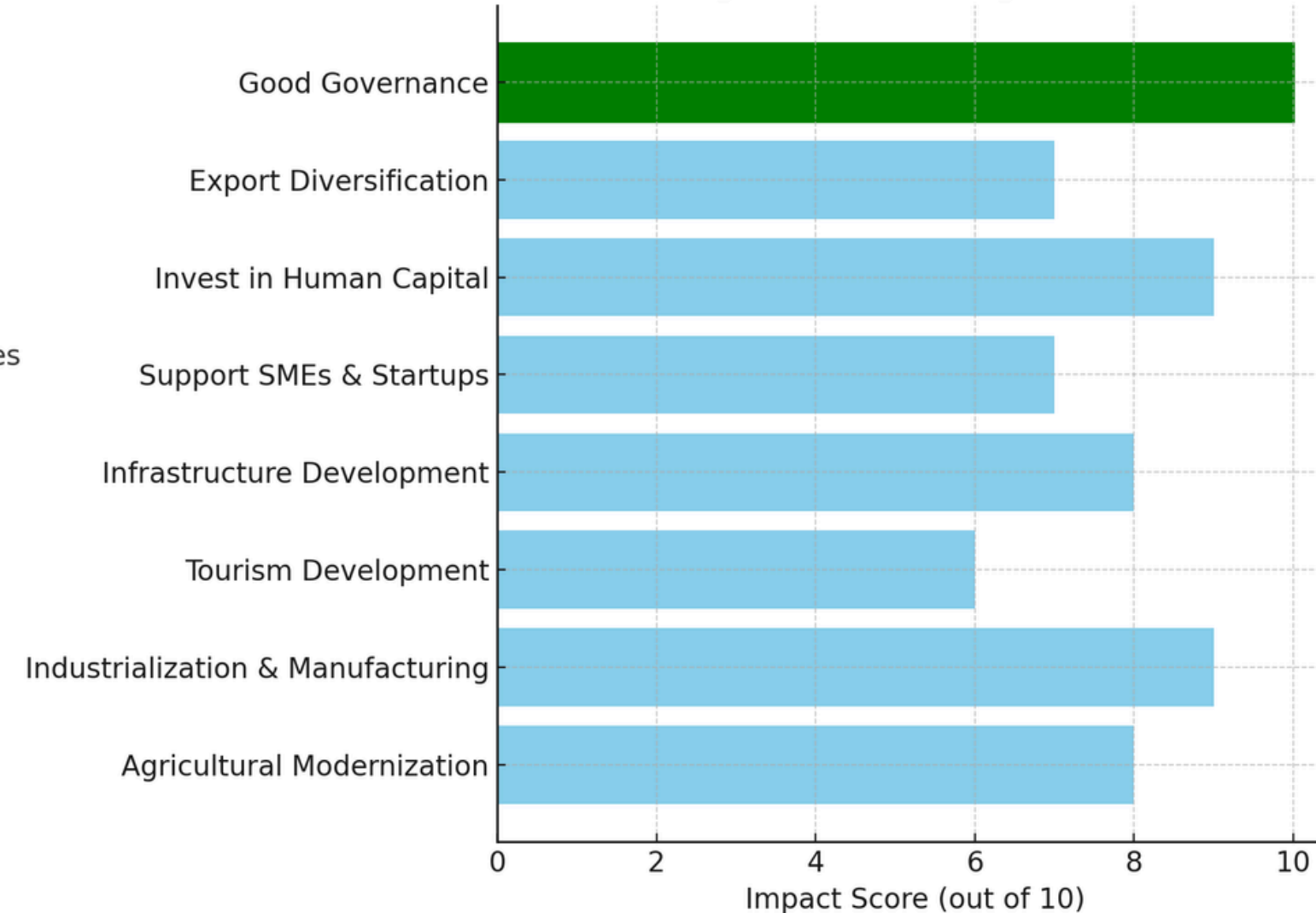
### Graph and Pie Chart

## OUR VISION:

TO RESTORE CONSTITUTIONALISM, DEMOCRACY, JUSTICE, AND NATIONAL UNITY BY REFORMING KEY AREAS OF THE 1995 CONSTITUTION, MAKING IT TRULY REFLECT THE WILL AND RIGHTS OF UGANDANS.

### RESTORE PRESIDENTIAL TERM LIMITS

#### Actions:

- Reinstate two-term presidential limits to promote leadership renewal and peaceful transitions.
- Protect the clause as non-amendable (entrenched) to stop future abuse of power.

### REINSTATE PRESIDENTIAL AGE LIMITS

#### Actions:

- Return the 35 to 75-year age limit for presidential candidates to ensure generational leadership and avoid life presidencies.

### ELECT AN INDEPENDENT ELECTORAL COMMISSION

#### Actions:

- Reform the Electoral Commission to be truly independent, not appointed by the president.
- Involve Parliament, civil society, and political parties in the selection process

### SECURITY SECTOR REFORM

#### Actions:

- Remove military representatives from Parliament.
- Make the UPDF neutral and professional, loyal to the constitution — not to individuals.
- Strengthen civilian oversight over the armed forces and police.

## KEY AREA

### REDUCE THE SIZE OF PARLIAMENT

#### Actions:

- Cut down the bloated Parliament to reduce the cost of governance.
- Scrap special interest seats that are abused and redundant.
- Promote merit-based constituency representation over patronage

### LIMIT POWERS OF THE EXECUTIVE

#### Actions:

- Reduce excessive executive powers over appointments, military control, and national budget allocations.
- Strengthen parliamentary oversight and judicial independence.

### JUDICIAL INDEPENDENCE AND TENURE

#### Actions:

- Secure the independence of judges from political interference.
- Establish transparent and merit-based appointment of judges.
- Introduce security of tenure and adequate funding for the judiciary.

### INTRODUCE REGIONAL AUTONOMY

#### Actions:

- Introduce Regional Governor leadership to reduce federal governance Demand (especially for Buganda and other regions).
- Consider regional governments for better local service delivery and unity in diversity

### LAND RIGHTS PROTECTION

## KEY AREA

### Actions:

- Ensure land remains in the hands of Ugandans.
- Strengthen protections against land grabbing by corrupt leaders or investors.
- Clarify land tenure systems in the Constitution, especially in rural and communal areas.

### CITIZENSHIP AND RIGHTS

### Actions:

- Simplify and protect citizenship rights, especially for refugees, diaspora Ugandans, and minorities.
- Strengthen freedom of speech, assembly, and the press — end laws that criminalize dissent.

### LIMIT THE POWERS OF THE EXECUTIVE OVER THE JUDICIARY

### Actions:

- Reduce excessive executive powers over the appointments of the Judiciary members (e.g, the chief justice )
- Introduce the Judiciary police Unit department ( protector of the constitution )

### INTRODUCTION OF THE CONSTITUTIONAL CONTROL

#### CENTER (CCC) (MAIN HOUSE OF THE AUTHORITY)

- The head of the house will be selected by parliament, civil society organizations, and human rights leaders in Uganda through a ballot vote.
- The members of the committee will include the retired president, chief justice, speaker of parliament, CDF, sitting president, inspector of police, head of religious leaders, president of UNSA, and president of the Uganda Law Society.

### WHY THIS MATTERS:

- A strong constitution keeps power in check.
- A broken constitution leads to dictatorship.
- Reforms are not about replacing individuals — they are about building lasting systems.
